















Sexual Risk Avoidance (SRA)



YOUTH WERE ASKED HOW LIKELY THEY WOULD BE ABLE TO DO THE FOLLOWING IF A PARTNER WANTED TO HAVE SEX AND THEY DID NOT:

"Stick to my decision to not have sex"
"Talk to my partner about my decision"
"Avoid getting into a situation that might lead to sex"
"Say 'NO' and explain my reason"
"Stop seeing my partner if they kept pushing me to have sex"
"Talk to a trusted adult"




Preventing STDs/ STIs, HIV/ AIDS, & Pregnancy




















Cultural Activity and Cultural Event Participation (last 12 months)









Youth who knew of Traditional/ Ceremonial Tobacco









During the post-test, the youth were asked questions about their experience with the 'We R Native' program to evaluate how, if at all, attending the program affected them.



95% of youth reported that they were more likely to use condoms or other barrier methods when engaging in sexual activity to prevent spreading of STDs/ STIs or HIV/AIDS



94% of youth reported that they were more likely to use condoms and/ or contraception when having sex to prevent pregnancy



94% of youth reported that they were more knowledgeable about the methods to prevent pregnancy until they are ready to start a family later in life



93% of youth reported that they were knowledgeable about the methods to prevent the spreading of STDs/ STIs or HIV/AIDS



95% of youth reported that they had a better understanding of how sex can affect their health – including mental, emotional, physical, and spiritual health
